Report:

Background:

Property Taxation is the main revenue source for the Municipality of Brockton to fund its operations. As such, the Municipality must ensure that this major source of revenue is protected and monitored closely. This report shows the level of arrears as of December 31, 2023 and the steps in the collection process to protect these receivables. The tax process is a highly regulated process under the Municipal Act.

In 2023 the Municipality of Brockton levied \$11,483,398 in municipal taxes, this was an increase of 9.81% over the 2022 levy, and this resulted in an annual increase to the average household of \$188.81.

Analysis:

This report is to provide Council with additional information on the Property Tax Arrears for the year ending December 31, 2023. Each year the municipality reports their financial position to the Province, below is a chart that illustrates the Provincial standards on Tax Arrears:

At the end of 2023, the overall outstanding tax arrears were \$636,703.89 (excluding accumulated interest). However, the total uncollected for 2023 taxes equals \$491,484.85 which equals a total of 4.28% of the 2023 Municipal Tax Levy. The chart below will illustrate the changes from 2018 – 2023:

The Municipality of Brockton had one tax sale proceeding in 2023. One (1) new property commenced for the Tax Sale Process in 2023; no accounts (0) are outstanding as all registrants have paid their taxes in full. Staff continue to work with residents to ensure their account remains in good standing.

Listed below are a few of the various tools that are utilized by staff throughout the year to collect tax arrears:

- Send tax arrears notices (monthly)
- Make calls to those who are within the two three-year arrears time frame
- Make payment arrangements to accommodate paying current year taxes, as well as any arrears balance

With the Municipality of Brockton having 4.28% outstanding Tax Arrears at year-end, we are below the Provincial low-risk average of < 10%. Therefore, this low average indicates that residents are able to pay their taxes, the Municipality has adequate tax collection procedures and low risk to cash flow issues.

In 2023, several supplemental tax bills and write-offs were processed. Many properties at the Walker West Subdivision, Turner Subdivision and JDR Subdivision have been reassessed due to increased housing construction in that area. Supplemental Tax Bills were sent to the residents, with payment due dates of September 29, 2023, and November 30, 2023.

Additionally, several write offs were processed. Write offs were most commonly for the Farm Tax Rebate Program as well as changes to physical property structures. Overall, the Municipality realized an additional \$180,602.37 in taxation revenue from the supplemental tax bills net of the write offs issued.
