DETACHMENT UPDATES

- The one Sexual Assault investigation has resulted in charges.
- Of the three Assault investigations, two were as the result of neighbour dispute and one was a Domestic.
- One of the Break and Enters also involved the theft of a motor vehicle. A stolen motor vehicle was recovered in its place.
- One of the Break and Enters involved theft of a significant amount of change from a Laundromat. Similar thefts have occurred across Grey/Bruce and are being actively investigated.
- The Mischiefs included dumping garbage, egging of houses and some painting done on a bridge.
- Despite the above Property Crimes are down overall.
- We are down in both Property and Personal Injury Motor Vehicle collisions, although we
 did have one Fatality in the month of April. One vehicle had been abandoned after an
 MVC and was later reported stolen.
- We are currently working with Kincardine PSB, Women's House and the Violence Prevention Grey-Bruce committee to put forward an application for funding from the new Provincial Community Safety and Policing grant. The focus of the grant will be on Community Education regarding Sexual Violence and Human Trafficking, with a component on supporting victims of these crimes. Kincardine PSB is open to including Brockton PSB in this project.
- With the end of the school year quickly approaching our School Resource Officers are engaged in educating students regarding the dangers of large Prom Parties. A media release was recently posted warning of the dangers of attending or hosting – please see attached.

•	Black Cat deployment updates will be verbally provided at the PSB meeting for McNabb Street and Elmwood.

INHERENT DANGERS OF ATTENDING AND OR HOSTING AFTER-PROM PARTIES

(SOUTH BRUCE, ON) - Summer is just around the corner and as the school year-end approaches, undoubtedly, teens will be attending graduation and end-of-the-year prom parties in the coming weeks. Will it be an alcohol and drug free party?

If alcohol and/or drugs are involved, it's quite possible the party may get out of control leading to situations where teens and young adults expose themselves to unnecessary risks, both legal and health related.

Youth who drink alcohol are at a higher risk of harm compared to adults due to their inexperience and lower tolerance. Quite often decisions made under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs lead to dangerous situations that can cause serious injury and death.

Members of the South Bruce Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are warning all parents and caregivers of the inherent dangers of attending and/or hosting after-prom parties. Property owners can and have been held civilly responsible for injuries sustained to persons on their property.

Police want to make it very clear that unsupervised after-prom parties and/or "field parties" are unsafe environments for anyone. Police are often called to investigate criminal reports of assault, drug and alcohol offences, sexual assaults, thefts, mischief and other related crimes stemming from these types of parties.

Police are encouraging parents and caregivers to speak with young people about the associated dangers of attending such events and find alternative activities for them to partake in.

For those who choose to attend or host one of these parties - they should be prepared for an increase in police presence as officers will be aggressively enforcing the law to ensure our youth enjoy these gatherings in a safe and responsible manner.

Some safety tips for teens on prom night:

- · Don't drink and drive
- Don't text and drive
- Don't take a ride from someone you know has been drinking or doing drugs
- After prom parties should be supervised by an adult and always go with a buddy
- Make sure a family member knows where you are and how to reach you
- Make sure you have your cell phone with you and make sure it is charged
- Whether you are in a relationship or with someone you just met, know your boundaries and communicate those boundaries with your partner
- If you or someone you know is in danger call 911

Some tips for parents to help keep their teen safe on prom night:

- Have a pre-prom talk remind students of rules/laws and the consequences for breaking the rules/laws
- Know where your teen will be after prom
- Set up check in times throughout the night to ensure your teen is safe
- Let your teen know they can call you for advice, help or for a ride
- Establish a code word so that your teen can let you know if they are in trouble and need help

Everyone has a part to play in community safety and it is the hope of the OPP that anyone with information on suspected field parties or unsupervised after-prom parties will contact the OPP at 1-888-310-1122, their local police, or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS).
